

ATV Goes To New Heights

ATV fans were certainly not disappointed Sunday, Oct. 4, 1991. The Dayton Amateur Radio Service broke an altitude record for displaying live ATV video from outer space. A lighter-than-airballoon carried this amateur radio package to about 140,000 feet in about 1 hour and 15 minutes. The W8BI balloon carried a 100 milliwatt transmitter with beacons on 14.035 CW, 144.34 SSB, and 439.25 ATV. The balloon rose quickly after its launch at 9:10 am. Sunday morning (15:10 UTC) and amateurs at the Dayton airport said they were tracking the bal-

northeast of Dayton on a heading of 066 degrees. An on-board altimeter was relaying the height and temperature to the ground crew and it was reported that it was a rather, balmy -17 degrees Fahrenheit outside the balloon. All during this time, a group of mobile balloon chasers were heading up Interstate 71 staying in contact with the ground crew and preparing to hunt the fox, when it descended. Net control took a breather after almost and hour and handed the net to WD9IZA. The balloon was 57 nautical miles downrange or about 65 statute miles northeast of Dayton at an altitude of 50,000 feet. The outside temperature was -29 F. A graph of the ascent shows the balloon rose most quickly



loon on radar. Rising at about 1,350 feet per minute after launch, the balloon was 10 nautical miles northeast of the Dayton airport 21 minutes after launch. Many amateurs were calling in on 7.258 giving signal reports for the various beacons. A station in London, Ontario reported seeing the ATV live video. By 9:39 a.m. or about 29 minutes after launch, the balloon had reached an altitude of 29,000 feet and the prevailing winds had carried the balloon 33 nautical miles

above 90,000 feet and many listeners were surprised that the estimated burst altitude of 120,000 feet was surpassed. From 10:14 a.m. to 10:43 a.m., amateurs received color pictures of the edge of space and "the curve of the earth." I think no one will disagree that the 24 min that the balloon stayed at about 140,000 feet and sent back live ATV pictures was impressive for anyone that was watching.

BANGLADESH operations by VK9NS and VK9NL as S21 ZA and S21 ZB respectively, are expected this week. Jim brought a linear amplifier and has a Yagi ready to be assembled when he arrives. Kirsti will stay one week, and Jim will stay two weeks.

AFGHANISTAN activity by YA2CW resumes this week. Jacky, F2CW, returns from vacation with a keyer and vertical antenna.

WAKE ISLAND will be active on SSB this weekend with AD1 S/KH9 on five bands.

ALBANIA continues to be active with ZA1 HA and ZA1 DX on all bands.

Look for EKORR/MM and QSO a Soviet Navy submarine in active service. UB5JRR cruises the Black Sea, transmitting underwater no less.

JUAN DE NOVA remains active. FR5AI/J appears at 1700z for list operations on 14256 kHz, and then on 21345 kHz.

BANGLADESH, S2. Two officers of the Bangladesh Amateur Radio League have been licensed. They are Saif, S21 A and Nazim, S21 B. Jim and Kireti Smith, VK9NS and VK9NL, have been issued S21 ZA and S21 ZB, respectively. The Smiths are expected to be in Dhaka in about a week or so. Jim helped draft the new amateur radio regulations for Bangladesh. Look for activity soon.

FROM THE DXCC DESK. The DXAC has unanimously declined a petition seeking new country status for Jarvis Island. The petitions cited Point 3B of the Country List Criteria, basing their argument on separation by economic zones. The DXAC ruled that this was not in accordance with current DXCC Rules.

AH3C/KH5J cards continue to be accepted by the DXCC Desk for Palmyra/Jarvis country credit,

ALBANIA, ZA. Documentation for the IARU group signing ZA1A has been accepted for DXCC credit. Licensed Albanian nationals are using ZA1TAA through ZA1TAL at this time. Other operators licensed by the Albanian PTT are using Z in the suffix, such as the French operation of ZA1ZXV, ZA1ZMX and ZA1ZVX. QSL these contacts to F6EXV.

TUVALU, T2. Andy, G4ZVJ, has left his 3D2VJ operation on Fiji and will be operating as T20VJ for approximately one week.

The ZA1A operation is over, the international group has left the country, but in their wake nearly 70,000 QSOs were logged and twelve new Albanian operators have been licensed. Listen for the new calls ZA1 TAA through ZA1 TAL.

Recent spots show ZA1HA, ZA1QA, ZA1ZMX, and ZA1ZXV to be active.

LESOTHO. ZS6AIS/7P8 is active. Check 24962 kHz at around 1930z and 14230 kHz around 0300z.

MONGOLIA, JT. JT1/SP5RB and JT1/SP5DRH are both active. Check 18069, 10101, and the lower 20 kHz of 15 and 20 meters.

SOUTH SHETLAND ISLANDS. HF0POL is very active again. Check 18122 and 18071 kHz at

around 0000 and 0200z, and 24902 kHz at 2300z.

FIJI. 3D2YI, 3D2YN, and 3D2TR have been reported active. QSL all three to JI1NJC.

Congressman Don Ritter of Pennsylvania has introduced a bill, the Federal Communications Commission Engineering Sciences Qualification Act of 1991, which would require that at least one FCC Commissioner, at the time of his or her appointment, either have a bachelor of science degree, hold senior or fellow status in a nationally recognized engineering society, or be registered as an engineer. According to Representative Ritter, the bill, HR 3501, was introduced to give the FCC greater ability to handle the complex technical engineering questions that will be coming before the Commission in the years to come. ARRL has not yet adopted a position on the bill.
