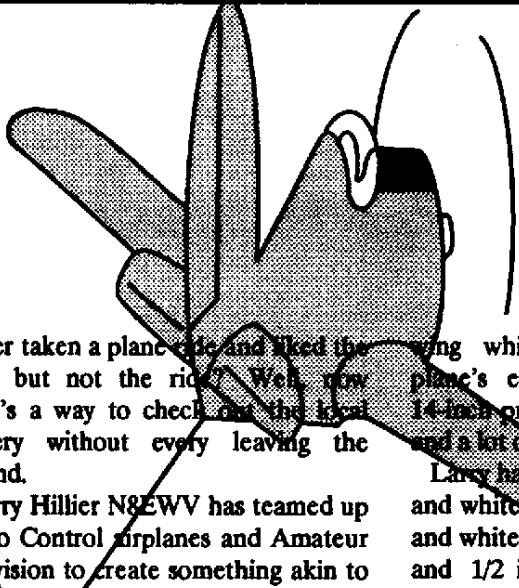

Club soars to new heights with ATV video

Ever taken a plane ride and liked the view, but not the ride? Well, now there's a way to check out the local scenery without ever leaving the ground.

Larry Hillier N8EWV has teamed up Radio Control airplanes and Amateur Television to create something akin to ATV air mobile.

Larry was the guest speaker for the November meeting and narrated a 20-minute video of some of his most recent ATV experiences in flight.

And what a view his plane offered! The color pictures from about 1,000 ft. were spectacular. He was using a home-brew plane -- a tail dragger with a Cadet fuselage but with a different

wing which spanned 7 feet. The plane's engine is a 4-cycle with a 14-inch prop. "It's has a lot of torque and a lot of power," Hillier said.

Larry has used two cameras -- a black and white and a color one. The black and white is about 3 inches long and 1 and 1/2 inches square. That camera costs about \$700 and brings the plane's total weight to about 12 pounds.

The camera is located in the nose and can look straight ahead or pivot 45 degrees up or down.

The flight pack includes a 1200 mA power supply. The longest Larry has flown the plane is for 45 minutes and he says the pack is good for 80 to 95

minutes. The operating frequency for the ATV transmission is 439.25 Mhz which he says can be picked up on cable channel 58 or 60 with an outside antenna. Audio is 146.865 Mhz.

The transmitter puts out about 1 watt, but at 1,000 feet, Larry says he has received a P5 (a very strong, clear picture) report from a fellow in Cleveland -- a distance of about 54 miles.

Larry's next goal is to work the plane while mobile in a van, so as to extend the range of the craft.

It's not as easy as it sounds. There were frequent crashes, he said, but with teamwork it paid off in the end.





Remember that early morning lightning storm that rolled through the area last month? Well, I was called out to a home near Westerville Lake to inspect lightning damage from that storm.

This house got hit at 7:10 a.m. -- and it must have been a direct hit because it vaporized the TV antenna right off the tower.

All that was left was the mast pipe and a little bit of hardware from the antenna just where the feedline and rotor cable entered the house. And there was a circular burn right there on the siding in about a 1 foot radius.

The ground wire from the lightning rods was buried about 6 inches below grade and the hole over the ground was covered with dirt and gravel. When that bolt hit, it was like setting off dynamite at that ground rod. All that gravel went flying and like bullets they pierced the vinyl siding in 20 or 30 places. The siding was also cracked, especially near the electric meter.

Inside the house, the phone line was burned in so many places that a new line had to be installed. But underground this time.

All in all, this has got to be a tie for the worst lightning strike I've ever seen. I'm glad it was someone else and not me!

After the fox

We may not wear red coats and ride horses over hill and dale, but we're fox hunters, too.

We're high-tech hunters who seek hidden transmitters. Our "fox," is a ham who finds a tricky spot to transmit from. And we compete to track and find the fox, before someone else does.

Our fox can hide almost anywhere, although private property and unsafe places are avoided. The fox does his or her best to confuse the hunters, and can sometimes be ingenious and, well, smart like a fox.

Foxes sometimes hide along creeks or rivers, where the signal seems to follow the water. Or else they hide along railroad tracks, where the signals seem to radiate from the rails. One fox hid atop a railroad overpass watching the hunters search; and he trans-

mitted taunts to hunters driving back and forth underneath.

Another time, the fox decided it was harder to find a needle in a needle box than in a haystack, so he hid on a used car lot.

A fox hunt is challenging, but not so much so that beginners can't enjoy it. Everyone has the same map and the fox must hide within the area covered by it, a square about 10 miles on a side.

If you haven't done fox hunting of the radio kind, consider riding with an experienced hunter. But don't be surprised if a beginner finds the fox while the pros are still stumbling around taking bearings. It happens.

Most fox hunts take place on the 2-meter band because more hams have radios for it than any other. And fox hunts are always on a simplex fre-

quency; otherwise the hunters would "find" the repeater, not the fox.

Equipment can be as simple as a handy-talkie held close to your body. You turn to find a null and look for the fox behind you. It works especially well when you're already close and the fancier equipment overloads. You can remove the antenna and walk backwards, keeping the fox in the null until you trip over the fox's antenna.

Small, close-spaced yagis are popular fox hunting antennas, as are loops and small quads. Mobile fox hunting antennas must either be small enough to drag inside the car or mounted outside, but rotatable from inside.

Finally, when you hunt alone, stop the car when you take bearings. You'll be less likely become an accident statistic.

Novice testing & the VEC

(Editor's Note: This article was edited for brevity and originally appeared in CQ Magazine, October 1992 in the Washington Readout column.)

Last May the ARRL and W5YI-VEC filed separate petitions with the FCC asking that all amateur radio license examinations be administered under the volunteer examiner coordinator (VEC) system.

The existence of the Codeless Technician Class has had a major impact on the Novice Class -- 75 percent of all first-time licensees now are Technician Class. In 1990, 88 percent of all newcomers entered at the Novice level.

In early 1992, Novice licenses were down 35 percent over 1991 and 52 percent over 1990. This is particularly significant when you understand that there are still 40 percent more beginners in total this year.

The ARRL and W5YI-VEC have both recommended to the FCC that all Novice examinations be included in the VEC system in the interest of efficiency. co

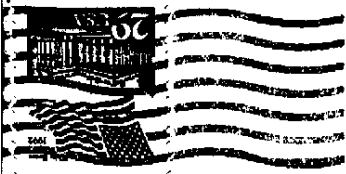
