Cold doesn't deter first Hunt of year

A newcomer, an old-timer and a river rat got their first taste of victory Jan. 16 for the first Fox Hunt of the new year.

The team of John Bray N8SFN, Bill Bennett W8ZZS and

Dan Mutigli N8LVO took first place on a cold, but clear Saturday on a typical winter day in Ohio. On paper, the threesome scored a decisive knockout, but it was closer than it appeared.

The first-place team had a final score of 660 points, while N8DZA finished second with 1,023 points and KC8WY took third with 1,274 points. The score is determined based on total mileage multiplied by the time in minutes; the lowest score wins. The next hunt will be Sat., April 17, 1993.

Both N8DZA and the firstplace team had the same mileage, but W8ZZS's team clocked-in right at 60 minutes, while it took N8DZA 93 minutes to find the fox.

The Fox Hunt saw three new faces to the sport. In addition to co-winner John N8SFN, there was Steve Huwig KB8NDM and Mike Duke (call pending) who both rode with Frank Sanor WA8WHP.

With so many new hunters, some teams had to double up. Dan N8LVO elected to sit in the back of Bill's Toyota truck so that John could pick up some pointers from Bill.

"Everybody thought I would freeze back there in an open pickup truck," Dan laughed, "but the wind really didn't hit you when you sat against the cab and the most trouble I had was from the dust the wind picked up and got in my eyes."

As for the hunt, "It was a combination of luck and technique that won it for us," Dan said. "When we got close to the shopping mall, we could see other fox hunters in the area doing their sweeps, so we knew we were close."

At that point, Dan removed his antenna and broke the squelch and heard a faint signal coming through on the fox's chosen frequency—147.51 MHz simplex. He told Bill W8ZZS to stop at a shoe store to take another reading. The 4-element

hand held beam, used for long-range triangulation was now useless at that point being overloaded by a fullscale signal in all directions.

Having no in-line attenuators, Dan huddled over Bill's Yaesu FT23R handheld like he was lighting a match in the wind. Doing a slow circle, he found a null and motioned to the others. "They've got to be behind me in this direction," he said pointing back toward the Continued on Page 5

Now you can send stories via packet

The Alliance Amateur Radio Club Zero Beat may now take your stories from any digital mode you choose.

The best way to proceed is to contact Dan Mutigli N8LVO, editor of the Zero Beat, on the 145.37 repeater in Alliance. This is to make sure his packet BBS is active since it is not a 24-hour-a-day BBS.

Dan operates his PBBS on 145.05 MHz usually from noon to midnight, every day, except during a 7-day period following the 14th day of the month. During this period, he uses the serial port of his computer for his mouse to design the newsletter.

Contact can be made any time with Dan once he has been contacted through the N8DZA repeater. Dan's packet address is N8LVO-1 on 145.05 MHz for the BBS or on 145.09 MHz for his designated home address: N8LVO @ KA8Z.OH.USA.NA.

If you cannot connect to Dan directly, try to digipeat through the Alliance node KB8NDM-3. The address would be N8LVO V ALLIAN.

The Zero Beat may also accept submissions as before on typewritten or formatted disk media. However, hard copies of all stories should be included in case the data cannot be read.

The word processing program Dan uses is for straight ASCII production. This means that if you send him a story, you should save it to ASCII if your program allows. A way to tell if your word processor stores to ASCII format is to save the story, then go to the command line in DOS and use the TYPE command to show the story you just typed. It should only have the written words and no strange looking characters in it if it has been saved in ASCII.

Dan uses the Avagio Desktop Publishing system. He can import graphics from the following formats: PC Paintbrush (*.PCX), Unison World (*.UWI), Postscript (*.EPS) and Tagged Image File format (*.TIF).

The metallic content of passivated glass, installed on many new cars, impedes the performance of antennas installed on glass. Passivated glass has a high metallic content to help block sunlight. Unfortunately, it's equally effective at blocking radio waves. Alternatives include using traditional mobile mounts or purchasing a car without passivated glass. For more info, check the glass index on the corner of the windshield.

center of the mall.

At that point the team was about 800 feet from the fox, who was parked at the far end which was packed with weekend shoppers.

"Dan was shouting out signal reports as we traveled down the length of the mall." Bill said.

"It was a textbook maneuver," said Dan. First there was just a scratchy signal, then it got clear and the S-Meter moved up steadily. I was shouting out 'S1, S2, S3, S4, etc.' A few seconds later, it was full-scale and I noticed Bill had pulled into one of the parking lanes." He looked up to see the fox's car a couple of parking spaces off to the side.

"From the time we took the last reading until we bagged them, took less than five minutes," Dan concluded. A fox hunt in Amateur Radio is actually a race to find a hidden transmitter. Hunts are rated by difficulty based on where the transmitter is located, how much power he runs and what kind of antenna(s) he uses. This was a Level 1 hunt, ranked the easiest to find.

The foxes, in this case, were John and Pam Myers WX8G and N8IAK. Tradition dictates the winner of the last Fox Hunt is the fox for the next hunt.

John and Pam were parked in the College Plaza Shopping Center on the east side of Alliance, about 3 miles from the start. They used an Azden mobile radio, with an unchanging output power of 5 watts, transmitting 1 minute on and 2 minutes off. Their antenna was a 1/4 wave mag-mount on the trunk lid.
