At it's worst, Gilbert was packing wind gusts of up to 225 MPH. One of the network news programs, showed a wind tunnel test on concrete blocks in 120 MPH winds, to illustrate the power involved. The 30 pound blocks might as well have been scraps of paper. Of course Ham radio was much in the spotlight during this disaster, as information was passed between the afflicted areas, and the rest of the world, via the only communications available at the time.

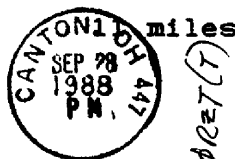
