Election time

According to the bylaws of our organization, the annual meeting for the election of officers will be held in the month of October. All full & sustaining members are eligible to vote, and run for office.

Duties of officers are spelled out in this excerpt from the Bylaws of the Alliance Amateur Radio Club Inc.:

Duties of officers

A. The President shall preside at all meetings of this club and conduct them according to Robert's Rules of Order. The President shall be responsible to ensure positions are filled to conduct business of the club. Examples of these positions are: Newsletter Editor, Equipment Chairman, Program Chairman, etc.

B. The Vice-President shall assume all duties of the president in his/her absence. He/she shall also organize club activities and programs not otherwise designated to a committee,

or other member.

C. (1) The Secretary shall record minutes of all meetings, keep a roll of members and receive applications for membership.

(2) The Treasurer shall receive and receipt all monies paid to the club, keep an accurate account of all monies received and expended, pay no bills without a majority vote at a regular meeting by the club, and shall make a brief financial report at each regular meeting.

D. All officers shall, within ten (10) days after the expiration of their terms, turn over to their successors all records and property of the club, that is in their possession, that is pertinent to the office vacated.

Nominations for office will be accepted at the meeting, but you can also get your name on the ballot by calling one of the trustees, whose names appear on page two.

WA6OTU's cheap ground rods!

I recently discovered a really cheap way to make ground rods, since I needed several of them for our 160 meter array at the Caltech Radio Club station, W6UE.

If you slip a length of 1/2" rebar through a length of 1/2" copper water pipe, you will find a perfect fit. By smashing the copper pipe onto the ribs of the rebar with a hammer, and by cutting an angle on one end, you can then drive the whole rebar and pipe combination into the ground without the pipe slipping up the rebar.

The cost of these ground rods is remarkable. I can get the copper pipe in single ten foot lengths at a local do-it-yourself warehouse for \$1.98, and the rebar is available in twenty foot lengths from the same source for \$2.20. This comes to about 31 cents a foot, or \$3.10 for a ten foot ground rod, easily one-third the cost of the real thing.

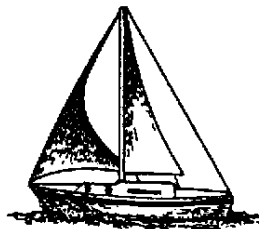

PACIFIC DXPEDITIONS. Teo, DJ1RL, and Harry, DL6NA, will be active from several spots in the Pacific. They plan to sign their home call portable from the following locations:

Hawaiian Islands, KH6 - From October 5 to 9. Nauru Islands, C21 -October 10 to 17. Fiji Islands, as 3D2FT - October 17 to 19. Niue Islands, ZK2 - October 19 to 22. French Polynesia, FO - October 22 to 28. Activity will be on the normal DX frequencies. Teo will be active mainly on CW while Harry will be handling the SSB chores. DJ1RL will be especially active on 80 and 160 meters. Look for him on 1827/1832 kHz for top band QSOs. QSL via their home calls or the DARC bureau.

ANDAMAN ISLANDS. VU2SMN says that he will conduct an operation from the Andamans at the end of October 1994. There are no further details or info available as of this time.

GHANA. In the first major contest operation from Ghana since 1982, members of the Central Arizona DX Association have big plans for the upcoming contest season. Their operations begin October 26 to November 4. Listen for 9G5TL in the CQ World Wide SSB Contest on October 29 and 30. QSL via Jack Sheldon, Jr., PO Box 31898, Mesa, Arizona 85275-1898.

Outside contest hours 3 stations will be up, with plans to hit all the bands. They will be on SSB, CW and RTTY modes. Operators include K5VT as 9G5VT, AA7NO as 9G5MB, KF7AY as 9G5WH, NZ7E as 9G5RM, WA7LNW as 9G5JR and WY7K as 9G5MT. QSL via their home calls.

A second group of CADXA members and some friends from the UK will be in the country from November 20 to 30. They will run a multi-multi or multi-single operation in the CQ WW CW Contest November 26 and 27. The contest call sign will be 9G5NN. QSL 9G5NN via G3SXW.

Outside contest hours listen for KC7V as 9G5MF, N7BG as 9G5TR, K7GE as 9G5JR, G3SXW as 9G5RW, GM3YTS as 9G5RF and G4FAM as 9G5CH. They will be on all bands with CW and some RTTY. QSL via their home calls.

PA QSO Party

Let the contests begin!

The first major contest of the season (to me, anyway), is the Pennsylvania QSO Party, which is held every year during the 2nd full weekend in October.

The object of this contest is to work as many stations as possible during the weekend. If you are operating from outside Pennsylvania, contacts with other non-Pennsylvania stations will not count. If you are inside Pennsylvania, you can work anyone for point credit. When the contest is over, your score is determined by multiplying the number of stations worked, by the number of multipliers you've worked.

All ARRL sections, Pennsylvania counties, and your first DX contact count as multipliers if your station is inside Pennsylvania. Non-Pennsylvania stations may only work Pennsylvania stations for credit.

The exchange couldn't be easier. It consists of a consecutive QSO number, followed by your ARRL section, or Pennsylvania county.

The QSO Party is one of the friendliest contests around, no matter which side of the border you're on. It's not unusual to find two stations sharing a single frequency, handing out QSO's net style.

This year, we have two stations operating portable from Pennsylvania. They are: Jim Ferguson N8DZA, & John Molesky N8PLA, who will be operating from Jefferson County, while John Myers WX8G will be operating from Indiana County for the 8th consecutive year.

There will be some extra logs and entry sheets available at the Alliance ARC meeting on the 6th of October.

VQ9, CHAGOS. VQ9QM says he will begin to be active on 160 meters every Sunday evening. No specific times or frequencies were given, but last season he was on 1827 kHz and listening around 1833 kHz around the East coast sunset. VQ9TP continues to be active quite frequently on 18079 kHz between 1330 and 1430z. QSL via N5TP.

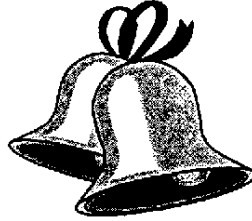

Q & A

Dear Elmer

Dear Elmer: I'm a new ham. Last night I went to my first local Ham club meeting, The Southern Nevada Amateur Radio League (SNARL). The folks were friendly, but I couldn't understand their lingo- the names of the bands, for instance. I overheard one old fellow say, "I got that ZK2 on 12, 17, and 30 meters." Another guy expounded on his new QRP rig for 14 MegaHertz. When I asked whether he ever worked 20 meters, he stared at me for a moment, then said, "20 meters is 14 MHZ..." I think he throttled the word "dummy" in his throat.

Later, someone suggested to his friend, "let's meet for lunch tomorrow; call me about 11:45 on 2 meters." "Okay, on the 147.99 machine" was the reply.

Back home, I pulled my ARRL

Handbook off the shelf and looked up the formula for converting from meters to MegaHertz. It says you divide the meters number into 300 to get MHZ and vice-versa. But dividing 300 by 14 MHZ gives 21.4 meters, not 20, and dividing 300 by 2 meters gives 150 MHZ. What gives? -Confused in the desert

Dear Confused: It all dates from lecher wires. Early hams measured wavelength with 'em, but a shortage of lechers during the great depression led to other methods. Lecher wires became obsolete.

Wavemeters served for a while. RF voyeurs built their own from designs published in Hamboy magazine. Others bought factory-made models.

Then factory-made radios came on the scene. Their dials were marked in Kilo-cycles, not meters, causing a lot of head-scratching at first.

BC-221 frequency meters, developed during World War II, were also calibrated in Kilocycles. They were cheap later and hams, ever in search of a bargain, snapped them up.

Soon almost all hams and electronics professionals understood cycles, Kilocycles, and Megacycles. But instrument marketers wanted to make sure the buyer was awake out there. "Buyer beware" is fine, but "buyers asleep" would ruin many a company. That's why the next triumph of measurement technology, the digital frequency counter, read in Hertz, Kilohertz, and Megahertz, not cycles, etc. So yes, you can convert from meters to Megahertz. The simple formula from the handbook is correct-but it misses the point about those band names. In the years since the lecher wire, the incessant drum-roll of technology has moved us forward.

In the old days, measuring to the nearest meter was pushing back science's...uh, well, it was an accomplishment. The old timers named the bands as best they could, rounding off to the nearest 5 meters. It was "good enough for government work," as they might have said. And the names have stuck.

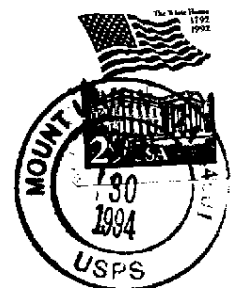
Prez Says
