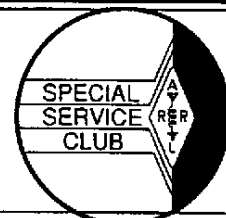

I'm writing this on New Years Day. 1995's already started off on a good note. I started by participating in Straight Key Night. It was a lot of fun, considering that I wasn't the only one on the band who was not accustomed to using a straight key. In fact, this was my first straight key QSO ever! I feel pretty good about that, although I'm sure the VE2 I was in QSO with could tell that it was my first time. I only managed one QSO, but that will change next year, after I get a little more practice on my homemade straight key.

I saved a part of the "Canton Repository," dated August 23rd, 1994. When I found it in my file, I wasn't immediately sure why I'd saved it. Silent Keys-A motion to make room for silent keys at the bottom of the club roster was approved by all.

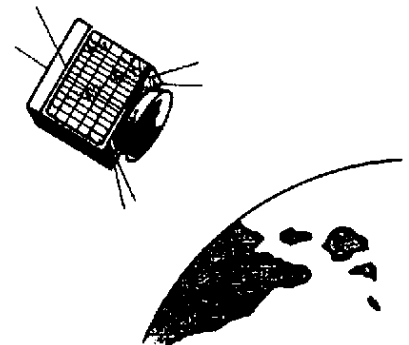
Fox Hunt-January 14th, meet at the flag pole at Butler-Rodman Park at 2pm.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:15 pm by N8IAK and seconded by K8OMO.

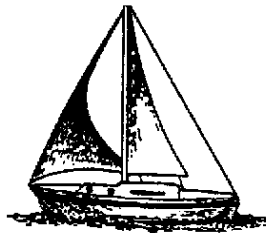

At 1932Z on December 24th, 1994, Jack reports calling CQ ARTIC CIRCLE. He was answered by VE1OR, one of Santa's helpers. Roy, reported that Santa had left 15 minutes previously, and to make sure the grandchildren were in bed early.

QST DE W1AW NEWINGTON, CONNECTICUT TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS- 9:45 P.M. E.S.T. DECEMBER 7,1941 BY ORDER OF THE FCC--ALL AMATEUR RADIO OPERATIONS IN THE CONTINENTAL UNITED STATES, ITS TERRITORIES, AND POSSESSIONS IS HEREBY PROHIBITED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE, EXCEPT FOR STATIONS SPECIFICALLY AUTHORIZED BY FEDERAL, STATE, AND MUNICIPAL AUTHORITIES IN CONNECTION WITH EMERGENCY MATTERS-STOP-THIS IS A PRECAUTIONARY AND TEMPORARY CLOSE-DOWN PENDING AN EXAMINATION OF THE AMATEUR SITUATION-FURTHER NOTICE PROMISED WITHIN 48 HOURS-STOP-LEAVE ANTENNAS UP AND DO NOT DISMANTLE RIGS-STOP-IN CASE OF LOCAL COMMUNICATION EMERGENCY, AMATEURS REQUESTED BY LOCAL AUTHORITIES MAY OPERATE FOR THAT PURPOSE-STOP-LOOK TO W1AW FOR FURTHER INFORMATION.

This message was received at 12:35 AM EST, December 8, 1941 by Jack W. Bennett W8WEN.

W8SNX Pittsburg, PA on 40 CW was Jack's first out of town contact and first 40 CW QSO. What a thrill. His rig was a 6L6 tritet Xtal oscillator into a 30 ft. wire antenna. He was so excited, that he forgot to throw the knife switch from receive to transmit. This meant that he was transmitting on six feet of wire from the rig to the knife switch down in his fathers basement. His receiver was a Spiegel Aircastle table model all wave radio. In order to copy CW, he connected a wire from the IF can to the grid of a 6DG6 tube, it would act like a BFO (you youngsters will have to look that one up in your handbook).

Jack also notes that in those days when your callsign would denote your current call area, W8SNX was in western PA; W3JNC was in VA; W9EGN in KS; W9JBG in MO; W9WVV in SD; W8 was KY. Boy, how things change.

A most dangerous radio

In the 1930's the merchant marines of Great Britain and the United States dominated the world. And I, as a teenager, wanted to become a ships radio operator. So I learned to be a morse operator. Many of my friends did likewise.

Marine radio gear, then as now, was usually the minimum that met legal requirements. Most ships had a simple crystal-controlled CW transmitter and a two or three tube receiver. The National SW-3 (a collectors piece today) was typical-with a regenerative detector and one or two stages of audio amplification.

A CW signal requires some type of "beat oscillator" to produce an audible tone. Those regenerative detectors oscillated to produce the tone. The oscillation power was a fraction of a watt, but with the worlds best ground and no isolation from the ship's antenna, the QRP signal could be detected at a distance.

German submarine torpedoes sent about three-fourths of the U.S. merchant fleet to the bottom. The British fleet suffered even higher losses. One of my friends survived two sinkings by "U-Boats." Another survived the sinking of five small freighters.

How did the Germans find the ships? The U-Boats would surface at night and listen for the signal of one of those radios. Finding one, they could trail the ship- sometimes a member of a convoy. They radioed the ships location and course to other U-Boats, who converged to form a line ahead to ambush the convoy.

It took a long time for our side to learn how the Germans located our ships. After the discovery, our orders for "radio silence" specified that both our transmitter and receiver were to be off. But until then, that cheap little radio led to the death of many ships and their seamen. Yet it was only doing what it was designed to do. Oscillate.

Lightning and your ground by Tim and Al Megahertzzi

Dear Tim and Al:

I plan to install a tri-band yagi and tower on the roof of my home. I'm concerned about lightning and would also like to know how to determine the effectiveness of my ground system. What can you tell me? Rob, KC6IRK

Tim: Excellent question Rob. Al and I will handle it in two parts. We will start here, then tell you more about effective ground systems in next month's column.

As everyone knows, lightning searches for the path of least resistance—the path of highest conductivity. So don't walk outside wearing a steel helmet during a thunderstorm, the way Al did last fall. You can see what it did to him.

Al: That had nothing to do with anything, Tim! Being charged up is just a natural state of existence for me. Rob, I'm certain your wife and kids wouldn't want your tower to "drop in" for a visit. They might not like having their house "fried," either, so do ground your tower.

A safe installation requires good design. You must connect the tower to the ground system using number 8 AWG or larger wire, wide, flat wire braid, or wide strips of sheet copper. The distance to the ground needs to be as short and direct as possible. Avoid sharp bends in the wire and space the wire away from the house with insulators.

Tim: That sounds complicated to me, Al. I suggest putting a 75-foot metal flagpole in front of my house, with a large metal American flag on top. Connect the flagpole to the metal sewer line running under the street with 4/0 wire borrowed from the neighbors power pole. Use silver soldered heavy-duty connector lugs bolted securely to the tower and sewer line, to provide a low-resistance path for lightning bolts.

Al: Tim, we already have enough evidence that you need a straight jacket! I agree on making the connections to the ground as direct as possible. If you can

do it without terminal lugs, all the better. Other factors to consider are multiple ground rods, in lieu of only one, and enhancing soil conductivity. We will cover that in next month's column.

Two reference books that provide lots of information on grounding and lightning protection are the ARRL "Antenna Book" and Joseph Carr's "Practical Antenna Handbook".

Tim: I hope our suggestions have been helpful, Rob. As Al suggested, further study on these subjects is necessary to gain an understanding of what you need to do, and why you need to do it.

Thank you for the Question. Al and I look forward to talking to you again next month.

Prez Says

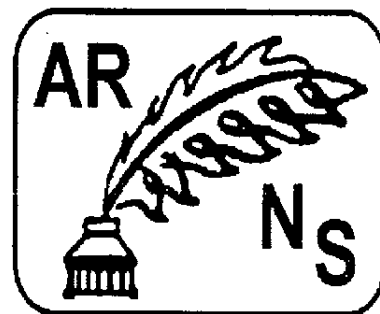
