Great Ohio Bicycle Adventure

This is just a reminder that the Great Ohio Bicycle Adventure will be pedaling through Alliance on June 19th & 20th. The participants will be well fed and taken care of by many of our local civic organizations. The AARC has been asked to assist with the communications for the event.

GOBA is a fundraising effort of the Columbus HI-AYH (Hostelling International - American Youth Hostels) and benefits bicycling programs within Ohio.

It is a 350 mile tour spread out over 7 days, with plenty of entertainment at night to keep the participants happy. The tour begins Saturday, in Medina, with a

day of workshops, practice rides, & special entertainment.

Sunday, the riders will leave for Hudson, where they'll camp for the night. Monday night, they'll be camping in Alliance. After leaving Alliance, the riders will be camping in New Philadelphia on Tuesday & Wednesday night, in Coshocton on Thursday, Wooster on Friday, and back to Medina on Saturday.

This may be the biggest thing since the Olympic torch came through the area. If you can help with this worthwhile undertaking, or if you need more info, contact K8OMO.

Field Day !

This years ARRL Field Day will be held on June 24th & 25. The operating period for this event will run from 1800 UTC Saturday until 2100 UTC Sunday.

Remember, Field Day is not a contest, but an operating event. The object of Field Day is to set up our stations under less than optimum conditions, and contact as many other Field Day stations as possible during the Field Day period. The main purpose of this event, is to test our emergency preparedness skills.

This year's location will be at the usual spot behind the Marlinton Middle School. The middle school is located about two miles west of Alliance, near the corner of Moulin Ave. & Beeson St.

We plan to begin setting up around 9 A.M. on Saturday, June 24th. Tear-down will begin on Sunday between 11 A.M. and 2 P.M. Plenty of extra help will be needed for both events, as well as operating, logging, and gophering.

At the time of this writing, we're planning on running 3-4 transmitters on all HF frequencies. Also, we might be operating some VHF frequencies, if the equipment is available.

For a callsign, we'll be using KB8YXT, our new club callsign.

Duping will be by computer, although paper dupe sheets will be available at some stations. Instruction will be given on the use of either.

Saturday night's dinner is being provided by Nancy Moretta, whose husband Bill (N8TLY) was a staunch supporter of the AARC. Breakfast on Sunday morning will be handled by David Hostetler, N8NLZ, AKA Chef David. Menus weren't available at press time, but we're sure it'll be great.

If you have some equipment to bring for the cause, let us know at the June meeting. This is already shaping up to be a good Field Day. See you there.

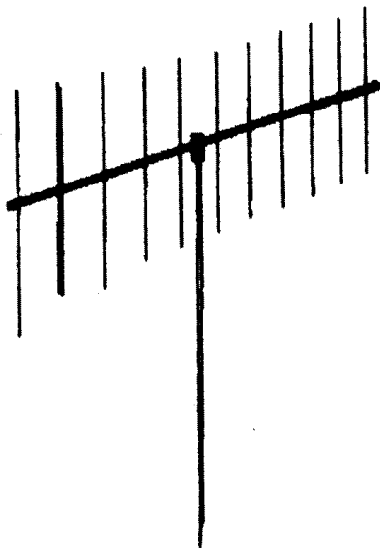
Fox confounds the hunters!

My first license was Conditional class, and of course I heard the same thing too - they called us "make believe Generals".

Short Circuits

Nice to hear all three of the Doe family passed their exams. If they are "typical" of the statistics, one of them will upgrade to General or Advanced within the next year. Another might upgrade to Technician Plus, and the third will lose interest in the hobby. Interestingly those averages are slightly better than the upgrade percentages back when Novice was the only entry-level license.

But the better news in your note was the 49 new Technicians who abandoned CB. (98% indicates 49 out of 50) Some of them must be rather sharp if they assembled and are maintaining their own repeater. Looking down the road, assuming we'll see the national averages, about 50% of them will upgrade, 20% will stay as Technicians, and 30% will lose interest. Roughly 18 months from now about 21 of them will be General or Advanced, 3 will be Extra, 10 will be active Technicians, and the remaining 15 will have lost interest. All in all, it looks like a nice net gain.

Just oh by the way, I found it interesting that the FCC data base does not contain any Jeff Davis with a WA4---Advanced license. Just as interesting is your CIS 6x3 membership number which doesn't seem of US origin.

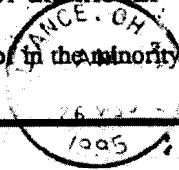
