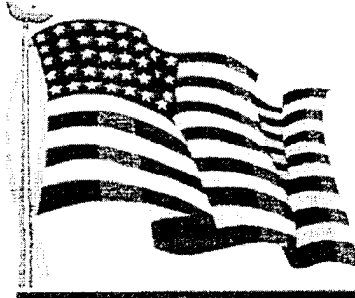


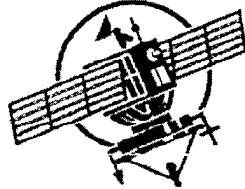

AGAIN!

The Soviet Union launched a small satellite on November 3rd. to commemorate the 40 th anniversary of Sputnik 1.

The satellite is not much bigger the a football and sends a beeping tone at the rate of about 14 every ten seconds or so. The satellite may be heard on a frequency of 145.820 MHZ. It is best listened to on upper side band but it can also be heard on FM with an HT if the pass is fairly close. It is expected to last for only about three or four weeks, so it may be gone by the time this hits your mail box. Don K8OMO has heard it and played a tape of one of the passes

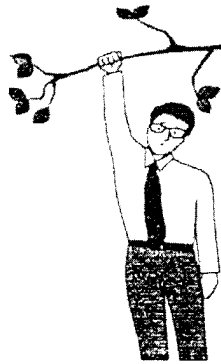
I can remember the night I first heard Sputnik 1 make a pass. I was only 16 at the time and studying for my Ham ticket. I had an ancient Philco chassis salvaged from one of the local dumps. As I recall it had six tubes and did not have a case. It glowed in the dark quite nicely and to me was the epitamy of what radio was about. I listened very carefully just abovr the twenty meter band. I eventually heard the pulsing signals with the doppler shift as it went over. I was suprised that the signals were so strong.

I was a bit disturbed that the Russians were able to launch such device. You will remember we were in the heart of the cold war and that most of our attempts were blowing up on the launch pads, some quite spectacularly. I could barely wait to get home from school and listen to the brave little bird make its' pass.

I am curious how many of our members remember the first Sputnik and its impact upon the world.

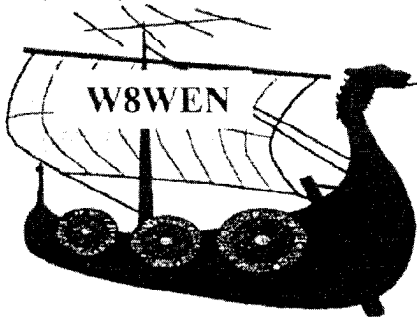

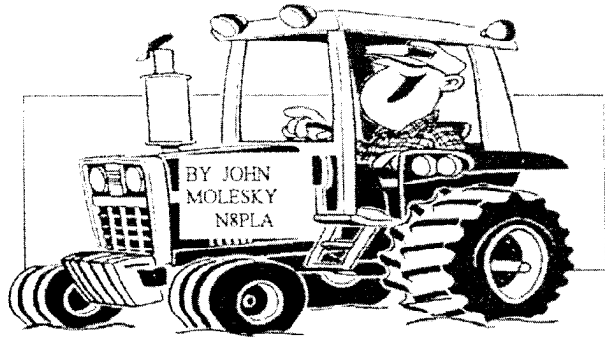

Jeff and Jake.

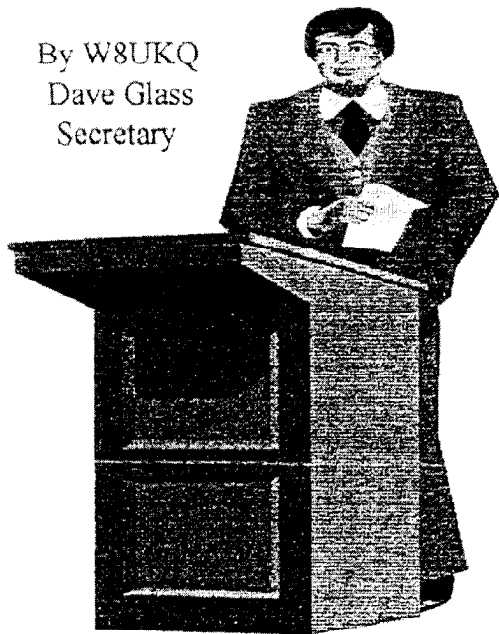

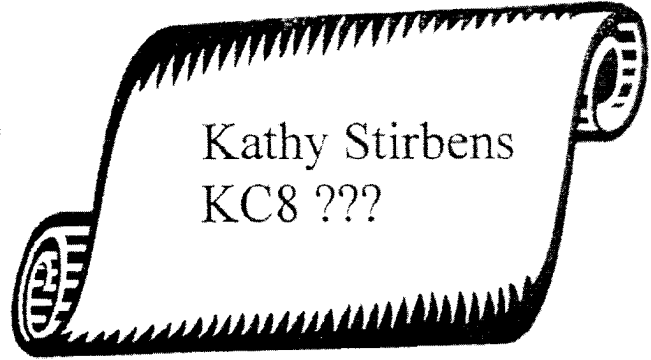
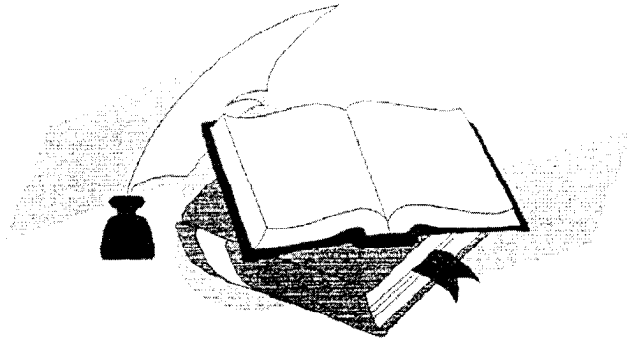

HAM HINT

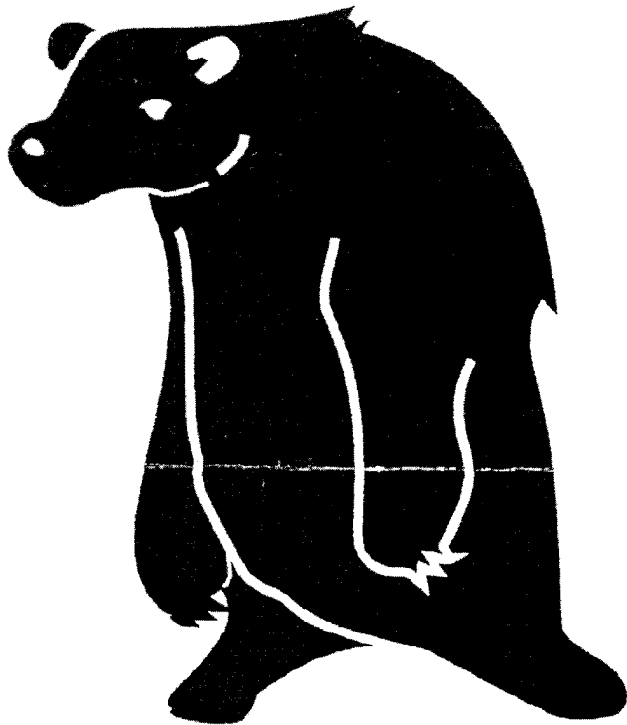
Do you have trouble soldering small assemblies or making connections to coax assemblies?

Well most of us do. As we get older we sometimes even get a bit schmarker. For years I have vexed my frustration over those things that seem to require more hands than the good Lord saw fit to provide me with.

The solution is an, old but excellent one that costs next to nothing to build. You will need a piece of wood about 4 x 6 by 1/2 inch thick, two wooden clothes pins and four small wood screws.

Affix the clothes pins to the top of the wood about five inches apart with the wood screws. You can give the whole thing a coat of shellac or varnish if you like. It will amaze you how well this simple tool can assist with the assembly of mike plugs, coax connectors etc. Give it a try, I would not be without mine!

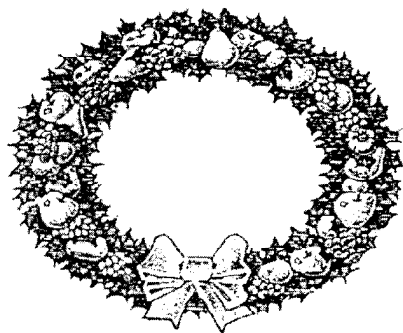
We got the Christmas Party to look forward to , and the Ham of The Year awards. Both should be a lot of fun.
