

# Horn Americas, and VHFTUHF America Testing by AASGY

Pyramida! Hern


Common Horn antennas are: E-plane, H-plane, Pyramidal and Conical. The E-plane is narrow in the vertical dimension in the feed wave guide and flaires vertically in the horn portion. The H-plane is thin in the feed wave guide as well but, flares in the horizontal portion of the horn.

The pyramidal is the most common horn type and the horn portion flares in both directions.

The pyramidal horn concentrates the beam in both the E and H planes. The most important use

is, of course, at ham VIIF conferences as a standard gain antenna (or other armateur radio applications.) The antenna under test is connected to a diode detector. The diode detector is connected to a voltmeter with a square law detector scale. The source is AM modulated.

The difference in distance traveled by the wave (from source to aperture) changes the phase in differing amounts at points, on the aperature (compaired to their corresponding source point).

The spark transmitter consists of roughly the following:

- 1. Motor Generator.

- Field rheostats -- control frequency and voltage.
- 4. Step up transformer
- 5. Ampmeter
- 6. Voltmeter
- 7 Wattmeter on transformer input.
- 8. Regulator on transformer
- 9. Telegraph Key.
- 10. Condensers.
- 11.Spark Gap.
- 12. Oscillation transformer conects spark circuit to antenna.
- 13. Antenna ampineter.
- 14 series capacitor in antenna circuit " short wave condensor".
- Antenna inductor -- lowers resonant frequency.
- 16. Antenna switch.
- 17. Antenna -- "Aerial"

#### Old Radio Speaks Again

The rusty chasis I paid \$6 for a Grunor 10 tube 3 band receiver is again a useful object. This is the story of how I brought it back to working condition. First the type 80 rectifier was pulled, then a power cord soldered onto where tho old one had been. Checked secondary of transformer for high voltage. To limit voltage and current so electrolytics could reform soldered a 100 watt light bulb in series with primary of transformer. Turned unit on for a second while monitoring high voltage. Turned unit on and off several times for increasing ammounts of time Believe this step was necessary because of action of voltmeter. Removed the light bulb from primary and powered up radio. No explosions. Removed speaker from free radio from hamfest and installed. Used secondary of a power transformer to replace electomagnetic speaker winding. Powered up radio no click when touching grids with insulated screwdriver. Looked up old tube in '39 handbook found plate - no voltage. Checkes IF can and wirewound resistor with voltmeter, and ohmeter. A 500 ohm wire wound was open in plate circuit to many tubes. Replaced with two series 300 ohm resistors much lower wattage, (but still there). Powered up can now tune one AM station -- big smile. Flip band switch several times to clean listen to am station. #### Old Radio Lives Contd.

So now I see smoke. The small screen resistor of dumbbell shape is cooking. Look in handbook screen resistor values typically 100k to 10k since it is red I guess 20k and put in two series 10Ks. Works but still low volume on all bands. Tweak antenna trimmer -- helps. Flip band switch again -- Boom! speaker blows my ears out! Turn down volume! Try shortwave 1 and 2. Have to tweak trimmers but they work now! Listen to Cuban, French, and Spanish language broadcasts, -- music everywhere. Welcome to SW broadcasting! A 0.1 uF paper capacitor starts dripping wax! Replace with parallel 0.05 uF ceramic discs -- no problem. Listen to WCBS on AM describe hurricane approaching Cape Cod at 11:30 PM. Started about 7:30 PM -- but I've done a lot of listening. From the tube line up design is from late 30's. From label radio was made in Chicago.

So next day I pulled the transformer shell off and use wire brush to remove rust then paint shell as it was solid rust and looked <u>bad</u>. So I'll let radio bake a little and cure paint. Vonder if it'll ever get a cabinet?




