We'll start setting up bright & early on Saturday, June 24th. The action con-




tinues until around noon, on Sunday, when the operators usually decide to close down, and start packing up.

Recollections, photos, and anecdotes sought for Colvins book

From the ARRL Letter, vol 20, no. 19, Rick Lindquist, N1RL, editor

A book now in the works will highlight the adventures of the late husband-and-wife DXpedition team of Lloyd and Iris Colvin, W6KG and W6QL. Author Jim Cain, K1TN, is seeking the assistance of radio amateurs and others around the world to share reminiscences, anecdotes, photos and other relevant information for possible inclusion.

Commissioned by the Yasme Foundation, the soon-to-be-published book will include a history of the Foundation and a biography of the Colvins. Anyone with information to share may contact Jim Cain at yasmebook@mybizz.net.

Iris Colvin died in 1998, and

Lloyd Colvin died in 1993. Between the 1960s and the early 1990s, the Colvins took ham



radio to some 200 countries-including nearly every member-nation of the United Nations. They racked up more
than a million contacts over
the years and amassed one of
the largest QSL collections in

the world--more than a half million cards at last count.

Yasme Foundation President Wayne Mills, N7NG, said the Foundation was extremely pleased to have retained Cain, a former ARRL Headquarters staff member and a ham since 1961, to research and write the Colvins' and the Yasme Foundation's story.

The Yasme Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation organized to conduct scientific and educational projects related to Amateur Radio, including DXing and the introduction and promotion of Amateur Radio in underdeveloped countries. Visit the Yasme site at http://www.yasme.org.

Alinco shifts North American distribution service to Ohio firm

Amateur Radio manufacturer Alinco has closed its US branch in Torrance, California, and shifted its North American distribution to an Ohio firm. Alinco product distribution and customer service now are being handled by Atoc Amateur Distributing LLC in Covington, Ohio. The change was effective

May 1.

A news release posted on the Alinco Web site says that Alinco will continue to be "a very committed, viable player in the Amateur Radio marketplace" and that all Alinco warranties "will remain in force and continue to be honored through their term." Alinco will exhibit at Dayton Hamvention next week and will sponsor the W8BI special event station in the outdoor exhibits area as it has in past years.

In addition to dealer distribution, the Atoc facility in Ohio is taking over customer support and out-of-warranty service of Alinco products and sales of Alinco parts. Parts sales have been temporarily suspended during the changeover, and service could be disrupted for a time as well.

The announcement said Alinco will concentrate on designing and manufacturing products from its Japan head-quarters in Osaka and factory in Toyama.

A Bit of History

Green Valley Radio Club W8SHZ Circa 1950-1965

The Green Valley Radio Club, organized in the early 1950's, was affiliated with the 3rd area state Civil Defense operations.

According to Jim Ferguson, K8LTG, the 3rd area CD covered most of northern Ohio. In the early days, They met at a house owned by John Derby, a non-Ham, who worked at Babcox & Wilcox, as a lab technician. Later on, they met at the Civil Defense shack at the armory.



According to Argus Barker, W8QMD, dues for junior ops were 50¢ a month. They also sold bonds for \$20.00, which went towards the purchase of a Johnson Viking Kit for the club. Someone had already donated a BC-348 receiver to the club.

The club moved out of the building in the mid 60's, when the state disbanded active area-wide CD operations. After that, the club existed only on paper. In fact, W8SHZ was still listed in the callbook, as late as 1976.

The first callsign trustee was Bob Sell, W8EK, followed by Charley Floyd, W8WJ.

We don't know a lot about the members, or officers of the club, since records are scarce. Bob Hoiermann, W8FBM was president in 1953, when Argus first attended meetings in the house on W. State St.

A Bit of History

Tri-County Radio Club 1950 - 1977



Not much is known about the early days of the Tri-County Radio Association. We know that the club was affiliated on May 9th, 1950, with John Hess, W8AT, as President, and Bob Hoiermann, W8FBM, as Secretary. The club callsign, W8LKY, was issued about the same time.

On July 29, 1950, they held a charter party at the YMCA. The guest speaker was John Brabb, W8SPF, who was the Great Lakes Division Director. He cited Amateur Radio as being an effective curb on juvenile delinquency, saying "any youngster interested in Ham Radio, doesn't have time to get into trouble".

Club meetings were held on the last Thursday of each month. The club met in the basement of Chapman Hall, at Mount Union College, (This was the headquarters for Civil Defense). Dues were 25¢ per month, per member.

The callsign was not re-issued in 1960. We didn't see W8LKY in the callbook again until about 1967- 68. By that time, the club listed it's address as the State Armory grounds, on west Vine St (later changed to 1175 ½ W. Vine St). This was the former headquarters of the Green Valley Radio Club.

Sometime in 1970, the Tri-County Radio Club was re-affiliated with the ARRL. The club continued on, until sometime around 1977-78.
