A few of the rules for the GOTA Station are:

- The GOTA station is allowed on any valid Field
 Day band, and mode, limited only by the license
 class of the control operator
- We can only claim 400
 QSO's from the GOTA Station towards our total
 score. But, we get a 100
 point bonus if the GOTA
 station reaches the 400
 QSO mark.
- An operator at the GOTA station is limited to a maximum of 100 QSO's

Precision Emergency Automated Position Reporting System Test Set

The Air Force Research Lab, Rome (New York) Research Site, will conduct an experiment using Amateur Radio operators as an auxiliary line of defense against aircraft disasters. The Precision Emergency Automated Position Reporting System (PEAPRS) test will be carried out in conjunction with the annual Team Patriot exercise. The ARRL is cosponsoring the test.

The test will consist of two aircraft flights sometime between June 3 and June 8. During these flights the aircraft will transmit a distress message, using the call sign WA2ZXS. Amateurs wishing to participate in this exercise should, upon receipt of the distress message, send an e-mail message to peaprs@rl.af.mil detailing the time, characteristics of

the message received and the method they used for reception (direct, via digipeater, via wide relay, Web, etc).

Those lacking e-mail capability may participate by calling their observation info into the PEAPRS Command Center at 315-330-7444.

The objective of this exercise will be to measure the timeliness and accuracy of the reports received from the amateur community.

Amateurs that

participate in this program will qualify for a special certificate from

ARRL recognizing their participation.

Fox Hunting, Public Safety Notifications

It has come to my attention from the State Fire Marshall that recently in Eastern Massachusetts, a club was conducting a fox hunt and left the fox near a public shopping mall. Although it was a totally innocent act, someone not familiar with the box the fox was contained in notified authorities and created a problem.

I strongly suggest that any club conducting fox hunts, notify public safety officials that a fox hunt is taking place in their community and where the fox is located. It would be very easy for any public safety official to consider the fox to be a "Device" and treat it accordingly. A photograph was included with the memo and there is no question in my mind that a person,

not knowing what the fox is, would consider it to be a radio-controlled bomb.

The events of 9/11 have considerably heightened public awareness of anything that looks suspicious. Many times, the fox is hidden in strange locations and this further complicates the problem. A simple notification made to the local public safety officials may eliminate a major public safety response and prevent our noble hobby from receiving any bad publicity. (From: Mark Duff/KB1EKN

French Picosats Transmitting

The two IDEFIX AMSAT-France picosats launched successfully by Ariane 4 Flight 151 have been transmitting voice and 400 baud BPSK telemetry since May 10. The battery-powered payloads remain attached to the third stage of the Ariane launcher at an altitude of approximately 800 km.

Downlink frequencies are 145.840 and 435.270 MHz. Both picosats should remain working for about 40 days.-- Jean-Louis, F6AGR/AMSAT-France (tnx ARRL Letter)
