
ARRL Convention

For the first time (so they say) the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) will be holding their **Great Lakes Division Convention** (GLD) on September 22nd in Independence, Ohio. The GLD Convention is usually held every two years in different cities, so this year it is in the Cleveland area (the day before the Cleveland Hamfest). So, what goes on at a convention? We submitted a total claimed score of 3,800 points We made 496 CW QSOs, compared to 383 on phone.. So, it looks like the CW boys won the "war of the modes" this year. We'll get em next year, though, says the editor.

George noted that the preparation to submit the results to the ARRL was not as easy as it should have been. According to George, N3FJP's software does not provide a printed output of the total QSOs per band; Something that the ARRL requires when submitting our entries. Hopefully that shortcoming will be resolved by next year.



September, 1987, (editor N8IAK)

- The program at the previous meeting was Jack, W8WEN, speaking on antenna rotators.
