AARC Schedules Fox Hunt For March 9th

After what seems like an eternity, the AARC has scheduled it's first fox hunt in several years. The action begins at 2 PM on March the 9th, at Glamorgan castle's north parking lot. This hunt will be on Two Meters, with the frequency to be announced at hunt time.

So what the heck is a Fox Hunt, anyhow? Well, it is more formally known as "Radio Direction Finding", "T-hunting", "Bunny Hunting", "Bozo Hunting", etc, etc. etc. The goal of a fox hunter is to be the first hunter to find the hidden transmitter, using only technology, and common sense.

Confused yet? Let's go a bit more in-depth. In a Fox Hunt, one operator is chosen in advance as the fox. Usually, this is the winner of the previous hunt. They're responsible for setting up the hunt, and being on the air at the announced time. They also get to choose the hiding spot. Transmissions from the fox should occur at regular intervals during the hunt. One minute on, one minute off, for example.

The hunters gather at the starting point, sign in, and wait for the fox to begin transmitting. At that time, using some type of directional antenna, the hunter takes their bearing. After that, the hunting style is up to the individual hunter.

One hunting style is to drive along the path of your first bearing, while watching your signal strength meter. If the strength starts fading, turn around, and head the opposite direction. Take other bearings along



your route, and adjust your route accordingly. You will eventually find the fox.

Another more efficient hunting style is to plot the first bearing on your map, then drive to a couple more locations, take more bearings, and plot them on the map.

In a perfect hunt, all the lines you've drawn on the map will cross at the same point, and that is where the fox is hiding. But, no hunt is ever perfect. In the real world, you have to deal with reflections, multi-path propagation, and outright trickery. All of these will combine to confound even the most seasoned hunter.

Once you have tracked the fox to a general area, your directional antenna may become unreliable, due to the strength of the foxes signal. At this point, it is good to have some means of attenuating the received signal. There are a couple ways to do this. Personally, I use a step attenuator that I built, using plans from the ARRL handbook.

Here's a neat trick, in case you don't have an attenuator. Tune your receiver slightly off of the

February Minutes

February 6, 2008

The regular meeting of the Alliance Amateur Radio Club was held at the Alliance Community Hospital on February 6, 2008 at 7:30 PM with club president Jim Ferguson, K8LTG presiding. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited, followed by introductions. There were 15 members present, along with Miriam Sanor.

For the secretary's report Don, AB8KV noted that the January minutes were in the newsletter. He then reported that the wife of Dave, N8NLZ had fallen and broken her collarbone. The Secretary's report was approved on a motion by Frank, WA8WHP and seconded by Larry, KE8VE.

Mary Ann, KB8IVS then gave the Treasurer's report. It was approved on a motion by Don, K8OMO and seconded by Howard, K8DXR.

Old business:

- VP John, KD8MQ reported that the proposed fund raiser was still on the table and that he favored the prize being a laptop. There is to be some discussion with Sam, KC8ETZ about what would be available from Best Buy and what pricing might be obtained by the club. Further fund raiser discussion was then tabled until the March meeting.
- VP John also reminded everyone that the club's March meeting will be held in the hospital's 2nd floor conference room instead of the usual location.
- Don, K8OMO reported that he had placed the equipment the club had for sale on the Trader's Net, but had received no

- response as yet. After some brief discussion with President Jim, it was decided to hold off further sales attempts until early spring
- VP John then raised the issue about whether the club should sponsor a special event station during Carnation Days. While there seemed to be general support for the idea, it was noted by Don, K8OMO and others that more effective publicity was needed to attract the public to both the special event station as well as Field Day. Some discussion about newspaper ads and other media followed. Also discussed were suggestions about exactly where to set up the station, operating times and lead times for reserving the JC pavilion or other location. The final decision about the special event station was then tabled until the March meeting. VP John stated that he would check on the lead time needed to place an insert in QST.

New business:

- VP John initiated discussion about this year's Field Day. Initial decisions made included selecting the Marlington Middle School again as the club's operating site, with Larry and Dianna to contact the school to arrange permission. Also, VP John stated he would reserve a Port-a-pot as in previous years.
- Don, K8OMO raised the issue about whether the classification should be 2A or 3A, with his feeling being that the club could handle the 3A. John then noted that there is a need to try to keep the bands operating with multiple operators, meaning that more people need to participate.

It was also noted that the network software needed some tweaking or perhaps replaced as not all of the information could not be downloaded at the end of last year's FD. George, K3GP reported on his efforts working with the software and also checking out another program which might be useful.

- The issue of publicity for Field Day was again raised with limited suggestions for any new approaches or campaigns. It was noted that perhaps a sign out in front of the school during FD would be helpful.
- Larry, AA8NV noted that Skywarn training was coming up March 18 at Stark State at 6 PM
- VP John reminded the club about the fox hunt March 9 at 2 PM, with some training to be held at the club's March meeting. He reported on his efforts at sending out publicity regarding the event to area clubs.
- Treasurer Mary Ann then reminded the club that annual club dues were due starting A p r i l l .

With no other new business, the meeting paused for a break. After the break, the club viewed a video about a French craftsman hand-making vacuum tubes.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:55 PM on a motion from Don, K8OMO.

"The Ultimate Steal" is a great deal for Hams!

I recently upgraded from Office 2000, to Office 2007. It has a fresh new look, and I'm sure there's a ton of new features. I've only begun to scratch the surface of what is possible with this new version. I will say that I was never a fan of Microsoft Outlook, but Outlook 2007 is Awesome!. I use it to manage my day to day schedule, as well as my contact list. This program alone, was well worth the cost of the software.

To get this deal, there are two hoops to jump through:

- You must be taking at least a half course load in college.
- You must have a college e-mail suffix which ends in <.edu>.
 Stark State students have a

<.net> suffix, but there is a procedure to get a <.edu> suffix.

If you meet both of these conditions, then you can get Microsoft office Ultimate 2007 (suggested retail \$679) for only \$59.95. We Hams are known for our frugalness, and this is one of the best deals, I've ever seen, and hasn't been real well publicized to the general public. Secondly, the default save format in 2007 is not readable by older office versions. If I'm working on a document that I'll need to edit on another computer, then I have to do a "save as" to an older office format, or it won't open elsewhere.

foxes frequency, to bring the signal back into the range of your S-meter. If you try this method, make sure to decrease the tuning step on your receiver first.

The winner is not necessarily the first hunter to find the fox. Hunts are sometimes scored on a combination of elapsed time, and distance traveled.

So, why do we hunt?

- 1) it's fun.
- 2) It's excellent practice in tracking the source of an interfering signal. This makes us more valuable to our safety forces
- 3) It's excellent hands-on training in VHF propagation.

(Feb 3, 2008) -- The Stark County Emergency Operations Center under the Direction of EMA Manager Tim Warstler and the Cleveland National Weather Service will sponsor the 2008 Severe Weather Spotter Training Meeting on Wednesday, March 19th at Stark State College of Technology. Registration will begin at 6:00 PM with the meeting to follow at 6:30 PM. The meeting will be conducted by Cleveland NWS Warning Coordination Meteorologist Gary Garnet. Skywarn training is free and open to the public. Public

Safety forces, hospital staff, school employees, ham radio operators and the general public are encouraged to attend. You do not need to pre-register but local ARES volunteers will be on hand to both verify existing spotter registration and to issue new spotter registration numbers to those who would like to register their location with the Cleveland NWS.

The training meeting will last approximately 2 hours with one short break and will consist of a powerpoint presentation together with movie clips and classroom discussion conducted by Gary Garnet. The goal of the training is not just to recognize tornadoes, but to have some understanding of storm structure which will better prepare you to recognize severe weather patterns.
