

Stark County VHF QSO Party Wrap-Up

April 6th was the Alliance ARC's latest running of the Stark County VHF QSO Party. In my opinion, it was the best one so far, with pileups noted on some frequencies. There was some inadvertent doubling of calls, but it happens at times. The purpose of this contest is to:

A) Provide an opportunity for local Amateurs to enhance their stations and operating skills.

By operating simplex, A lot more is learned about VHF propagation , than can ever be discovered by working repeaters. It also points out why the ¹/₄ wave mag-mount stuck to your home A/C unit may not be the best setup for your VHF station.

B) Simulate emergency conditions (with NO repeaters).

It's pretty simple to call a friend 20/30 miles away on VHF when the repeater systems are functional. However, not so when the repeaters are down. An exercise like this can be a real eye-opener.

C) To enhance utilization of the 2 meter band and simplex operation

And utilize it we did! It is good to occasionally remind everyone that there are more frequencies on VHF FM than just repeater pairs.

D) To have fun.

What can I say about this one? I had fun, and from the phone calls, and e-mails I've received, so did the rest of you.

One of the phone calls I received touted, among other things, the cooperation that exists between the three Stark County clubs. This contest is just one example of that cooper-

April Minutes

April 10, 2013

The regular meeting of the Alliance Amateur Radio Club was held on April 10, 2013 at 7:30 PM in the first floor conference room of the Alliance Community Hospital with club President Frank Sanor (WA8WHP) presiding. The pledge of allegiance was recited followed by introductions. There were 22 members present along with Miriam Sanor, Alfreda Steele and guests Terry Russ (N8ATZ), Matt Welch (W8DEC), James Aylward (KC8PD), and Mike DiCarro (KD8FLZ).

Prior the business meeting, President Frank turned over the floor to Matt Welch (ARRL Ohio Section Emergency Coordinator) for his program on ARES. At the conclusion of the presentation and a question period, the business meeting went forward.

Committee reports:

- For ARES and nets, Don (K8OMO) reported that the Homeland Security net has been active, covering a 5-county area with three hospitals on the net. He added he hoped to get other area clubs involved with helping hospitals become more active for this net. He noted that the Thursday 10-meter CW net needs more participation while the 10meter SSB net has averaged around 6 check-ins. Smitty (KC8TJQ) reported that the 2-meter net is doing well, averaging 15 to 16 check-ins.
- Regarding the repeaters, Frank noted that Echolink is now operating 24/7, with Don adding that there are now four control operators. Don noted that work was still under way toward linking the 2-meter and 70-cm repeaters. He further stated that starting this summer, a transmit PL tone of 88.5 would be added to re-

Hams Continue to Help in Wake of Boston Marathon Bombings

The following comes from the <u>CO News-</u> <u>room Blog</u>

When two bombs exploded near the finish line of April's Boston Marathon, the first thing ham radio net controllers did was check in on each of the 250 ham volunteers working the course to make sure they were OK (they were).

Next, according to reports from ARRL and Newsline, the hams continued providing communications as police halted the race and runners began to congregate at first-aid and water stations along the route, all of which had ham stations as well.

The hams kept runners updated on events and coordinated deployment of "sweep buses" to transport runners still on the course to pre-arranged meeting areas. Hams in the finish line area remained at their posts and provided communications as needed from the medical tents until police - fearing additional explosions - ordered everyone evacuated.

- President Frank reminded the club to check the newsletter for the latest information on area hamfests. Don (K8OMO) added that he had requested two free tickets from the Breezeshooter's hamfest since they now required those interested to ask for the tickets instead of their simply sending them out to many different clubs. Don noted that the tickets could be used in the club's monthly drawings.
- Frank announced that the following Saturday was the date for the balloon lift-off from the University of Akron. He noted the uplink and downlink frequencies and that the lift-off was scheduled for 1:00 PM. John added that the information is on the web site and that he had emailed club members about the event.
- Frank stated that regarding classes and testing in the area, the Columbiana club was to conduct classes, but he was unsure of the date, so he suggested those interested monitor the club 2meter net as the information would most likely be forthcoming.

I met Bob Rickard KB8GAG about 25 years ago. He was just moving back to Alliance from New York where he ran an Underwater Salvage Co.

He purchased the old Battershell Turkey Farm on North Rockhill. Bob met Jim Ferguson K8LTG at Shaffers and Jim got him started in Ham Radio. Bob attended some of the Classes the Club had back then and got his ticket, He already knew the code from being a Pilot during the Berlin Airlift(1946-1947) in Germany. After that, he started flying for Pan American Airways and flew Clipperships across the ocean. I don't remember him saving he ever flew Commercial planes in the US.

Bob sure had some good stories to tell. He was a real nice guy, who was 91 years old when he passed away.

Many of us flew radio controlled planes out at his farm and also sailed boats on his lake.

Bob's ashes were scattered to all four winds over the farm; a fitting thing for him . OMO

Discussion followed, considering the cost difference and whether it would be better, in the event of a liability claim, to have local representation through Hatherill rather than ARRL/Hays. At the conclusion of the discussions, John made a motion to renew with Hatherill/Erie, with a second provided by Jerry. The motion was carried by a voice vote. Frank then directed Mary Ann to go ahead and complete the renewal.
- Frank then addressed the issue of Field Day, noting that the site has been reserved but that help is needed for set-up and to provide food. John suggested setting up a meeting for all those interested to address the various Field Day issues. It was decided to meet at Sheetz on Monday, April 15 at 7:00 PM.
- Steve noted that a replacement snatch block at the top of the tower was needed. He asked for the ok to obtain the item. A motion to approve the purchase and reimburse him was made by Don (K8OMO) and seconded by Jeff (KD8QCF), with final approval given by voice vote.

Craigie. Do you recognize it now? She is the President of the ARRL.




It made me think, what other famous people might I have worked. I have a QSL card from K7U-GA. I worked the special event station three years after Barry Goldwater died.

The Ham Radio Bucket List By E. Mike McCardel, KC8YLD From The Ohio section Journal

I am sure we all are aware of what a "Bucket List" is. Popularized by a movie "*The Bucket List*" starring Morgan Freeman and Jack Nicholson, two people who were told they had limited time left on Earth embarked on an adventure to fulfill their dreams, before they kicked the bucket.

I was recently inspired by a post to the AMSAT-BB list by Les Rayburn, N1LF. He recalled his meager and poor beginnings in ham radio 40 years ago, barely affording his simple station. He went on to state "My Elmer used to let me borrow his copy of QST and I'd dream about all the great adventures that I'd have "someday" in ham radio. Being a child of the Space Age, key articles among them were anything related to the New Frontier.

"EME (Moonbounce), Meteor Scatter, and satellites all seemed like the stuff of science fiction---and I longed to experience them all. But they were exotic, and required equipment far beyond my reach. I resolved to accomplish them all someday and added them to a sort of ham radio "bucket list" that I hoped to accomplish before my ham career was over."

Well five years ago he checked off the first of this list after working meteor scatter with the aid of WSJT software. More recently he made his first satellite QSO with Art, K4YYL on FO-29, a Japanese amateur satellite.

This hit home with me because working the ISS was one of the reasons I got my ticket ten years ago. It only took me 8 years to get around to building and working a satellite ground station. I still haven't talked directly with someone on the ISS but I have bounced packets through it and have made other satellite QSOs. What finally got me started was a demo by an 18 year old student who convinced me, I could do it.





Two DXing organizations used the forum provided by the 2013 International DX Convention in Visalia, California, to announce the launch of a "sustained and ongoing effort" to organize a major DXpedition to North Korea (P5).

Intrepid-DX The Group and the World-Wide DX Group issued a joint statement in which they said discussions have been under way for four years with business and tourism professionals who regularly do business in North Korea, that several group members and advisors have made multiple visits to the country, and that a comprehensive proposal for a four-week ham radio operation had alreadv been delivered to officials of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea through a Chinese emissary. "We are committed to work as hard and as long as it takes to activate this rare and much needed entity," said the statement. P5 is at the top of virtually every DX "most-wanted" list.

W8P Spreads the Word about End Polio Now

On Saturday and Sunday, February 23-24, 2013, amateur radio operators gathered at WA2HOM, the amateur radio station at the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum. We were there to operate special event station W8P to commemorate the founding of the Rotary Club on February 23, 1905 and spread the word about Rotary International's End Polio Now Campaign (www.endpolio.org).

The goal of the End Polio Now program is to rid the world of this terrible disease. Rotary International launched this program in 1985, and with the aid of UNICEF, the World Health Organization, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has cut the number of cases by more than 99.9%. In 1988, polio was endemic in 125 countries. In 2012, polio is endemic in only two regions. We like to say that we're "this close" to eradicating polio.



The unique part of the special operating event is that stations all over the world took part in it. Rotary is an international organization, and its amateur radio fellowship, Rotarians on Amateur Radio (ROAR), includes members all over the world. In Australia, a group operated the special event station VI4POLIO. In Europe, Pertti, past president of ROAR, operated his station, EA7GSU. Here in the States, a group that included yours truly; Jack, N8PMG; Jameson, KD8PIJ; Dinesh, AB3DC; and Mark, W8MP operated W8P.

Since the museum is only open from 1500Z – 2200Z, we were only able to operate for seven hours on Saturday. We spent all of our time on 20m phone, with our beam pointed southwest, concentrating on working mostly U.S. stations. We had originally intended to operate on 14.287 MHz, but quickly had to change frequencies, as that portion of the band was occupied by participants in the Mississippi QSO party.

We finally ended up on 14.227 MHz and made a total of 110 contacts on Saturday. This included 29 states and four DX contacts.

On Sunday, we only operated for a couple of hours and made another 27 contacts. While we made fewer contacts on Sunday, the contacts that we did make were more poignant than the ones on Saturday.

My first contact on Sunday was with a gentleman who was spending the winter in Florida, but whose hometown was Standish, Michigan. He told me that his mother had polio, and in the late 1930s and early 1940s, they would put her on a bus for Ann Arbor, where she would receive treatments. While there's no way to be sure, I think that this ham's mother was taking part in some of the research leading to the Salk vaccine in 1955. That research took place right here at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

I also talked to hams that had direct experience with polio. One was a polio survivor himself. Another's wife was a polio survivor. A third was a physician who had been to Africa and had treated polio victims there.

It was a real treat to combine two activities that I enjoy so much-amateur radio and Rotary-and it felt good to know that in some small way I was furthering the work of the End Polio Now campaign. I hope that next year we will once again operate this special event and get even more Rotarians and amateur radio operators to participate.
