Treasurer's report:

Treasurer Mary Ann (KB8IVS) gave the report. It was approved on a motion by Tom and seconded by Tomas (KC8ZEH).

Old business:

- Frank addressed the issue of the special event station in August. One question was whether to provide either a certificate or QSL card or provide both to those who contacted the station. After some discussion, it was decided to send both so long as a SASE had been provided.
- Frank reminded the club about the Field Day work party at Tony's (KD8BBK) on the upcoming Saturday at 10:00 AM.
- John then spoke about Field Day plans subsequent to a FD committee meeting held last month. Highlights included:
 - •The club is listed on the ARRL's FD locator.
- •The tentative set-up schedule is to set up the wire antennas on Friday the 21st at a time to be announced. John figured that pizza would probably be ordered that evening. On Saturday morning, the tower and beams would be erected along with setting up the stations and logging network.
 - Lunch plans were under way.
- •Saturday evening would be a covered dish dinner, with everyone encouraged to bring something to share, along with John bringing his grill.
- •The club will operate class 4A this year. Operators are needed, with club members strongly urged to participate.
 - •Individual stations would be assigned specific bands:
 - 80/10 meters (possibly switching to 160M at night), 40M, 20M and 15M.
 - •Any VHF or UHF station set up is a free station.
 - •There will be no GOTA station this year.
- No laptops are needed, as Ben will have pre-configured laptops available for each station. Participants can bring their own headsets if desired so long as an appropriate adapter is available.
- Needed are munchies, hot/cold drink cups, table service, soda and bottled water. Also mentioned was the need for a generator, which Tomas stated he would provide.

- John encouraged those involved to pursue any possible avenue for bonus points, within the ARRL guidelines.
- It appeared that adequate rigs and antennas were available.

New business:

- Frank announced that the next club meeting on June 12 would be in conjunction with a picnic at the cabin in Silver Park, from 5 PM to 10 PM. As usual, everyone was asked to bring a covered dish with drinks and flatware being needed. The regular business meeting would be held.
- Frank asked John to address the Stark county VHF QSO party results. John announced that
 more logs were received than ever before. AARC won the club award, with the following individual awards for fixed stations: First place went to Don (AB8KV), second place to Don
 (K8OMO) and third place to Paul (K2ASA).
- Frank then asked Tom for some remarks he wanted to relate. Tom stated that he had talked to a fire fighter from the Alliance fire & rescue department. This person stated that regarding the upcoming mock disaster drill at Mt. Union college, it was hoped that the AARC would be invited to participate because their 800 MHz portables would not reliably penetrate through concrete walls. Frank then stated that the club would have to be asked by the powers involved, with John adding that obviously we do not self-deploy.
- Don (K80MO) then noted that he had some money to turn in for the club. Some parts he had ordered to repair a donated item proved to be defective and a refund was issued by the supplier. Also, in response to a request from an area ham in need of a base repeater antenna, Don sold him an older club antenna unit that was too large for the club's use. He then turned in the funds to Mary Ann.
- Frank raised the issue about classes this fall, asking the club what the general feeling was.
 After some discussion, the general opinion was to pursue classes again, probably at Marlington.

The business meeting was then adjourned at 8:08 PM on a motion by Tom, seconded by Jerry (KG8RN). After a break, Bob Warner and Phil Bresky checked rigs and other equipment brought in by club members, using diagnostic gear they had brought with them.

Random Access

by Franklin Sanor, WA8WHP

Well another month, another opportunity. I want to thank everyone for their help getting ready for Field Day. The tower and hazer unit went together very well and Tony and Steve did an excellent job on the attachment and adjustments needed to get the system working. The crew that braved the cold wind on the hilltop deserve hazardous duty pay.

I was planning a sequel to the article on WWV. Now seems an opportune time to do that. One of the many valuable functions of the stations in this system is the frequency standards. The radio frequencies are as accurate as the state of the art permit. The audio frequencies are also of the same standard. To ensure we stay within our allotted frequency band limits we must be sure our equipment is calibrated as accurately as possible. The procedure can be found at http://www.scribd.com/doc/14005425/frequency-callibrationusing-wwv. This is a free two part pdf file with a very good description of the method using the audio tones. I recommend you read it and put it in practice if you have the necessary test equipment. A method using only your rig and ears is to zero beat your VFO during the period WWV transmits the unmodulated ticks. This occurs during the time period of 45-52.5 seconds after the minute on WWV and 52.5-60 seconds after the minute on WWVH.

Most modern transceivers have the 10 MHz band in them. This facilitates this procedure very well. One caution. Be sure you zero beat during the un-modulated tick period. If you do this during the modulated ticks you may tune to the sideband of the audio signal and you will be off by the tone value. This may be as much as 1000Hz if that was the tone during the time you were attempting the calibration. If you have an older rig without the necessary 10 MHz band, all is not lost. Most counters have 10MHz oscillators that can be zero beat to WWV (see your manual) or build a stand-alone oscillator/ divider system to use as a frequency secondary standard. This has an advantage of giving a set of calibration points at 100KHz, 25 KHz or any other point you want as long as the divide chain can produce it

Wikipedia has a very exhaustive explanation of all the parameters of WWV/WWVH.

The ship has an amateur radio station, W6RO, on board and it is open to visiting amateurs.



Lastly, in the **Mobile** Category, the winners are:


1st place - John, KD8MQ
