Random Access By Frank Sanor, WA8WHP

Another Field Day in the books. Most of us had fun and made some contacts. What did we learn? What can we improve and how can we do that?

One thing I learned, long hours for an old timer are very wearing. I tried to last all night. I ended up going to bed at about 4AM. This leads me to the idea of maybe more operators and shorter shifts. Let me know what ideas you have for improvements. Some of our members operated for the first time. Others are old timers at this. Why are some reluctant to operate? They don't know what to do? Ask. They aren't proficient? Practice or team up with another member. I saw this at least twice this weekend. A different set of ears may help dig that CW signal out of the noise. Do not have skills at the computer logging? Ask for a logger to help. Don't know how to use a particular mode? Find someone who has done some or is interested in that new mode, for you. CW is daunting for some. The answer is practice, practice and more practice.

We have a CW net on Thursday nights at 8PM local time. Check in. Get a computer tutorial for CW. I do not encourage the records or tapes as you tend to memorize them instead of learning the code. The random nature of the computer generation is easier to learn the code. Do not learn the alphabet in order. You then tend to go through the list until you get a match. That will make you miss two or three letters that followed the one you were trying to copy. The

best way is the frequency of occurrence. That would be:

First group, E,I S,H,5,T,M,O,0.

Second group: A,W,L,J,U,V,1,2,3,4.

Third group: N,D,B,6,G,Z,7

Fourth group: C,Q,P,R,F,K,X,Y,8,9.

When you are hearing these with recognition, go on to the punctuation and other characters. Using the Farnsworth method, letters sent at 18 WPM spaced at 5 WPM, you will not hit the 10WPM wall. This is a hard plateau to overcome as at lower letter speeds we tend to count dits and dahs. At the higher speed this is less likely and you will learn the complete sound of each character.

Even old dogs can learn new tricks. There are many new digital modes using an interface between our rigs and computers such as PSK31, WSPR, RTTY (not really new but now using computers instead of teletypes). Again, let me know your thoughts. What do you want to see? What do you want to learn? Any complaints?

June Minutes

June 12, 2013

The regular meeting of the Alliance Amateur Radio Club was combined with the pre-Field Day picnic and was held on June 12, 2013 at 7:30 PM in the cabin at Silver Park with club President Frank Sanor (WA8WHP) presiding. The pledge of allegiance was recited followed by introductions. For the meeting portion of the event there were 24 members present along with spouses, friends and guests including Alfreda Steele, Esther Smith, Miriam Sanor, Jesse Evans (KD8KDK), Rick Smith (KC8SUI), Carl Mani (K7CE) and Judy Kingan.

Committee reports:

- Nets: Don (K80MO) reported that the HF CW net has been very slim with the HF SSB net averaging 6-8 check-ins. Smitty (KC8TJQ) reported that the 2-meter net has been averaging 12-15 check-ins, but that he would like to see more.
- For the repeater committee, Don (OMO) noted that the 2-meter club repeater would soon have an 88.5 tone squelch added to help alleviate interference from another repeater in West Virginia.
- Website: John (KD8MQ) reported that the Field Day page is constantly updated and that after FD, the results will be posted as soon as they are available. President Frank asked if silent keys are being posted with John answering yes. Frank added that the club's silent key plaque is full and needs an addition soon.

Frank then asked for a moment of silence in respect for two hams who had recently become silent keys: Gloria Lazear (N8PLN) and Larry Newton (N8BGJ).

- President Frank then announced birthdays for the month. These included George Matinides (W8AKU), Dianna Ashburn, Jerry Wheeler (KG8RN) and Dana Evans (KC8LKB).
- Frank noted that operating events can be found listed in QST and the website. He added that the only testing site he knew of in the next few weeks was being run by the Western Reserve club at the airport in North Lima, on FD Saturday.

Secretary's report:

Secretary Don (AB8KV) gave the report, noting that last month's minutes are in the current newsletter. He went on to report that he had sent a condolence card on behalf of the club to Chuck Lazear (N8PLM) for his wife Gloria. He stated that he had submitted the information for the special event station during Carnation Days in the Park to QST, CQ, World Radio and eHam, with the submission to QRZ to come later due to their threading by date. He reported that he and Tom (KD8JRK), who had volunteered to help, were working on the publicity for FD. This included items such as attending an Al-

liance city council meeting, preparation of a newspaper article for the Review, public service announcements for the radio and letters to various officials. Don concluded the report with the comment that he believed all the membership cards for this year had been given out or mailed.

Don (OMO) then asked if the reservation for the Jaycee pavilion in Silver Park had been made to accommodate the special event station. It was realized that no one had done so. Secretary Don volunteered to secure the reservation. The Secretary's report was then approved on a motion by Tom and seconded by Smitty.

Treasurer's report:

The report was given by Treasurer Mary Ann (KB8IVS). It was approved on a motion by Smitty and seconded by Tom.

Old business:

- Regarding Field Day, Frank noted that food requirements had pretty well been taken care of, as had the large sign (provided by Tony—KD8BBK) at the camp entrance. He reminded the club that this year the class would be 4A, so operators were needed. John added that anyone wishing to learn about the N1MM logging software should attend a training session on Tuesday, June 18 at 7:00 PM at the hospital main conference room. Frank and John reiterated the tentative schedule, with wire antenna setup on Friday evening and the balance of setup done on Saturday morning.
- Frank stated that the intention is to start licensing classes in September, probably on Tuesday evenings from 7-9 PM. They would hopefully be held again using Ben's (KD8KMQ) facilities. Frank noted that he had one person lined up so far to teach, but more help was needed.

New business:

- Frank raised the issue of the Ohio QSO party, which is scheduled for the fourth Saturday in August. He asked for suggestions as to where the club might have it, but follow-on discussions indicated a general feeling that participating in that a week after the special event station was a bit much. A motion was subsequently made by Tom to skip the QSO party as a club function this year. This was seconded by Tony and passed on a voice vote.
- Frank then mentioned the upcoming Alliance city council meeting which was to be addressed by Don (AB8KV) or Tom or possibly others. He encouraged other club members to attend the meeting. There were then extensive discussions involving suggestions for approaching the council, what to say, documentation, and general issues of amateur involvement in emergency situations or public functions. At the conclusion, it was decided to keep the presentation simple and invite the council to Field Day to see amateurs operate under simulated emergency or adverse conditions.

July, 1988, (editor N8IAK)

- Pam announced that she was discontinuing the "Ham of the Month" feature, in favor of a "Spotlight on local Hams" feature.
- On May 31, the Roadway terminal burned, sending a chemical cloud over the north end of town. Many people were evacuated, and lots of businesses closed for the day. (ed. Note – We could hear the sounds of cans popping over a mile away.)
- The local ARES group was not called out, however, the city began thinking seriously about putting together some emergency preparedness plans.
- AARC members had assisted with communications for an aerobatic competition at Berlin Aeropark.
- The club had been offered space to set up an information table, and special event station during the Taylorcraft fly-in at Barber airport.
- Planning was getting started for Novice classes to be held in the fall.

July, 1993, (editor N8LVO)

- John, your publisher, gave a first person account of the bitterly cold spring fox hunt. Dan N8LVO, who was the fox for the hunt challenged that he would never be found. Don, K8OMO asked him what made him think anyone was looking for him?
- OMO lost his tower to an early June storm.
- We were putting together a covered dish dinner for Field Day 1993. Dave, N8NLZ volunteered to cook the evening meal, and breakfast the next day.

- The Zero Beat received an excellent rating from the Amateur Radio News Service.
- Current club membership stood at 43 members

- The AARC was invited to operate from Seven Ranges Scout Camp in Kensington.

World Radiosport Team Championship



Are you aware of the World Radiosport Team Championship? It is also known as WRTC and is held every four years and consists of approximately 50 two-person teams of Amateur radio operators from around the world competing in a test of operating skill.


Paper Chase by Joe, W8KNO



This past month I also received a QSL Card commemorating "Ellis Island". For you who are Islands on enthusiasts, it is Air NJ036S. How many islands have you worked? Take a count and you will probably surprise yourself!

Ellis Island is in Upper New

York Bay. It was the gateway for millions of immigrants to the United States as the na-





tion's busiest immigrant inspection station from 1892 until 1954. The island was greatly expanded with land reclamation between 1892 and 1934. The island was made part of the Statue of Liberty National Monument in 1965, and has hosted a museum of immigration since 1990. The island has been closed to the public since Hurricane Sandy in October 2012 with no reopening date projected.

A trivia question: Do you know who the first immigrants to off load at Ellis Island? The answer is Annie Moore and her two brothers on January 1,

1892. A statue commemorating this appears on the landing in Cobh, Ireland. You can see the statue behind KD8EPF and her girlfriend Phyllis of Vidor, Texas.

Memories are as good or better than paper. So get on the air, make contacts and when you receive a QSL card it will bring

back memories.

Tomas' Hot Corn Dip Recipe

2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

1 cup shredded Monterey jack

2 tbsp. chipotle peppers in adobo sauce (diced small)

1 [4oz] can diced green chilies (undrained)

½ cup mayo or sour cream

¼ tsp. garlic powder

1 [11 oz.] can corn (drained)

1 small tomato

2 tbsp. cilantro (chopped)

2 tbsp. green onion (sliced thin)

Preheat oven to 350. Mix the cheeses, chipotle, green chilies, mayo, garlic powder and corn together, pour into oven safe dish.

Bake 20 min or until golden brown and bubbly. Top with diced tomato, green onion and cilantro. Serve immediately with tortilla chips.

Tomas' Jalapeño Popper Dip Recipe

6-8 slices of bacon (diced and cooked crispy)

2 8-oz packages of cream cheese (soft)

1 cup of mayonnaise...I use sour cream...

4-6 jalapeños (chopped and deseeded - the seeds will make it fiery hot)

1 cup of cheddar cheese (shredded)

½ cup of mozzarella cheese (shredded)

¼ cup diced green onion

Topping

1 cup of crushed crackers [I use Ritz]

½ cup Parmesan cheese

½ stick of butter (melted)

Pre heat oven to 350. combine all of the ingredients into a medium bowl. stir well. Transfer to an oven proof dish. The size of the dish depends on how thick the dip is. The thicker the dip the longer it may need to warm up. I used this stoneware dish that is round and measures 12 inches across. My dip is usually about an inch thick. Combine the topping ingredients and sprinkle all over the top of the dip. Bake the dip for 20-30 minutes or until bubbly. Serve with tortilla chips. YUM, YUM, YUM !!!!

13 Colonies Special Event Set



The annual 13 Colonies Special Event will take place during the first week of July, with participating 13 colonies' stations on the air from 1300 UTC July 1 until 0400 UTC July 6. Event sponsors say at least two special event stations will operate from each colony state. The theme for 2014 is "Banners of the Revolution," and the certificate -- available to all participants regardless of the number of stations worked -- will reflect that theme.

Those working all 13 colonies qualify for a "Clean Sweep" certificate designation,

and a special endorsement will be attached for stations working WM3PEN in Philadelphia. The suggested exchange is call sign, name, signal report and state/province/country. The event's sponsors report that more than 62,000 contacts were logged in last year's 13 Colonies Special Event. More information is available on the web. (www.13colonies.info)

Thought you might like to pass this along.

As safety officer for the Raytown club a few years ago I had the idea to distribute a simple form to be filled out and kept in a sealed envelope in a person's pocket. It had all of the information that an EMT might need to begin first aid.

Such things like existing conditions, the doctors involved, their phone numbers, medicine being taken (name, dosage, frequency) and emergency contact information. It also included a preferred hospital and family doctor's name and phone number. Allergies were also included.

For three years it was never necessary to use it....then came 2013 field day.

I had to use it! Heat exhaustion combined with other things and took me to the ground. The envelope was given to the ambulance personnel. On the way to the hospital, as oxygen and cooling began to work, they expressed their appreciation of the form.

You never know.....it could be you.

I strongly recommend this idea for every club since field day in the Midwest is always (so it seems) hot and humid and has other dangers as well.


Old-Timey Magazine
