Committee reports:

- For the repeater committee, Don (OMO) noted that the repeater system took a lightning hit during a recent thunderstorm but that the Polyphasers prevented any damage.
- Website: Ben (KD8KMQ) noted that the website had been down periodically for maintenance.
- President Frank then announced birthdays for the next month. These included Butch Lebold (WA8SHP), Preston Wegman (WA8NEJ), Peter Lucke (N8IGZ), Dallas Underwood (KD8JRY) and Tomas St. George (KC8ZEH).
- He also announced that there was to be a memorial service for Gloria Lazear (N8PLN) the upcoming Saturday at the Baptist church in Beloit at 1:00 PM.
- In other announcements, Frank reminded the club that the next meeting on August 14 would be held in the basement conference room of the hospital. There was also a reminder of the Portage hamfest on July 28 and operating events listed in QST.
- Frank addressed the issue of classes, noting that he was aiming for Tuesday evening sessions at 7:30 starting in September. The planned location would again be in the computer lab at Marlington high school.

Secretary's report:

He then announced the operator awards: Top operator was Butch (WA8SHP), with second place going to Don (K8OMO) and a tie for third place between Tony (KD8BBK) and Mike (KD8RUQ). John added that he had some Field Day patches, giving one to Noah Kee (KD8SBS) for youth participation with the rest being placed in the 50/50 drawing prize pool.

New business:

- Frank stated that a Sebring resident had contacted him about getting licensed and was wondering if the club was going to be at the Mile Branch Grange Fair. Frank inquired of the club if there was any renewed interest in participating in that event. The general response was no. Frank then noted that he would try to work with the individual toward licensing since the person's work schedule did not permit him to attend classes or club meetings.
- Don (K8OMO) announced that thanks to the efforts of a member, the club would be receiving a certificate for having worked all 13 original colonies plus the Williamsburg bonus station the previous weekend.

With no further official business, the meeting was paused for a ten-minute break. After the break John presented a program on portable operation and mini-DXpeditions.

- Plans were being made for the 1993 AARC Mall Show.
- Speaker at the August meeting was Chuck, N8LIV
- Don, K8OMO, Jack, W8WEN, and Jim, N8DZA (now K8LTG) were planning to do a show on keys, at Mount Union College, in August
- Club membership stood at 46 members
- Our club picnic was coming up on August 7th.
- August, 2003, (editor KE8VE)
- Frank, WA8WHP was to take the club membership on a tour of WDLI, Ch. 17.
- The club had set up a display, and information table at the Mile Branch Grange Fair.
- The 2003 Field Day totals reflected 576 Q's (41% CW / 59% Phone).

August, 2003, (editor KD8MQ)

- Our Annual special event station was coming up soon. As usual, we were scheduled to be set up in the Jaycee Pavilion at Silver Park.
- The AARC Spring Fox Hunt was held, with the fox hidden at Beechwood playground. All hunters found the fox in 30 minutes, or less.

His family is struggling to raise the funds to have his remains interred next to his wife's. This is where our help would be appreciated.



Paper Chase by Joe, W8KNO

Last month, I mentioned that memories are recalled when you receive a QSL card. I received one last month from N3MK. It was not important because it was a new county or that it was on six meters. The thing that got me was it was from Chincoteague Island, Virginia.



What makes Chincoteague Island so memorable? Two herds of wild horses make their home on an adjoining island, Assateague Island, which is separated by a fence at the Maryland-Virginia line. On the island are small but sturdy, shaggy horses which have adapted to their environment over the years by eating dune and marsh grasses and drinking fresh water from ponds. While they appear tame, they are wild, and Park Rangers urge visitors not to feed or pet them. The Maryland herd is managed by the National Park Service. The Virginia herd is owned by the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company. Each year the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company purchases a grazing permit from the National Fish & Wildlife Service. This permit allows the Fire Company to maintain a herd of approximately 150 adult ponies on Assateague Island. The Fire Company controls the herd size with a pony auction on the last Thursday in July. Each year tens of thousands of spectators come to watch the Saltwater Cowboys swim the pony herd from Assateague Island to Chincoteague Island.

According to Terry, N8ATZ, who is our county EC, they had about 35 volunteers this year. That's a small number considering the distance that the grand parade has to cover. Interestingly, listening to the grand parade communications, only one local Ham was heard; KD8JRK. Tom has volunteered for the last several years to help with parade communications. He seems to be the only Alliance area Ham volunteering to assist with parade communications; no one else! This needs to change.

I believe it behooves us to reach out and volunteer for events based on need, not geographic area. What affects Stark County, affects us.

Stark County Radio Clubs - While we are on the subject, this club needs to step up & cultivate closer ties with the clubs in the rest of the county. Mike, WA8MKH as president of the Massillon club has been pushing for increased cooperation between the clubs, but he can't do it alone. He needs our help.

Incidentally, Mike, WA8MKH is also the source for all the great technical articles you've been seeing lately in the Zero Beat. This month, we are running another of his works; a History of the Cambridge Amateur Radio Association. They are celebrating their 100th anniversary this year. I regret that I have not run this one earlier in the year. Thank you Mike for this fine article!.

Cambridge Amateur Radio Association - W8VP 100th year Anniversary



1913 The Cambridge Amateur Radio Association (CARA) began as the Wireless Association of Cambridge founded on December 4, 1913 by Roy Waller, J. Homer McMunn, Edward "Tom" Sarchet, George Rubicam, George Robey, Don Hinton, Paul Simcox, E.D. Shipley, Ray Sears, and Miss Nellie Waller 8ACU (Roy's sister and 4th female operator in the U.S.). This group of wireless radio operators and experimenters were real pioneers in a new technology, with no "experts" or "old timers" to consult for assistance in their

endeavors. Transmission and reception of signals in those early days was primitive and limited. Wireless operators were licensed by the government and were allocated specific segments of the radio frequency spectrum for their operations and experimentations. Our first president, Roy Waller 8CL, put the first wireless station on the air in Cambridge (1914). He founded the first commercial broadcast station, WEBE, which became WHIZ.

1919 – 1949 J. Clayton Nicholson, first licensed 8CFM in 1919 at age 13, was a very active "CW" (Morse code) operator who handled hundreds of messages each month, and in 1928 changed his call to W8VP. In March 1935 he became President of the Cambridge Amateur Radio Club and founded the "hamfest conventions" of 1935 and 1937 in the National Hotel in Cambridge. He was a Naval Reserve Radioman Chief and taught radio for the Navy. In 1949, the Club obtained permission from his family to adopt his call, and W8VP is now heard as the identifier on the club's repeater system (146.850 MHz).

1950's – 1960's Two former presidents, AI Blancett W8BMS and Clarence Waller W8RVU (Roy's son, now W8CL) were the main driving forces with the organization, and Joe Wagner WA8AHV (SK) helped form a radio club at Cambridge High School. During this period, alignment with the Civil Defense of the county was forged, and many technical achievements through amateur radio were developed which are in use today. Then, in the 1970s came the development of the high frequency repeater systems. Former president, Ron Rogers WB8ERB, developed and placed into operation the first computer controlled repeater system in the state. An updated version of this system is still in operation today.

1980's - 1990's Space communications began here when CARA made a radio contact with the 1st space shuttle ham in space, Owen Garriot W5LFL. Technology then began to include ham satellites and moon bounce communications. CARA set many national VHF communication competition records; some still stand today.

2013 CARA consists of approximately 50 members led by President George "Sonny" Alfman, W8FHF. Sonny has been an active driving force since 1962 and has been the club's president more than twenty years, leading mentor (teaching over fifty radio classes) and technical adviser. In 1999, he formed an organization called the Multi-County Coalition of Eastern Ohio (MCC). The MCC, which consists of about 110 hams from nine counties, meets to coordinate radio communications for disasters and large public events. The MCC exist today only as a net.

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Ther past presidents of the club include: Paul Simcox 8NZ, Rankin Cohagan W8NBM, Jim Hoag W8NQX, Dick Barrett WA8ALS, Charles Galloway WD8KNY, Steve Brown WD8QJB, Dean Jenkins K8KNL, Cam McCartney WB8TSI, Bert Nagy N8GUU, Frank Hyder N8ZJF, Fred Barton KB8MGI, Evelyn Barton KA8NZS, and Bruce Homer N8JMK. For more information on our early history, see <u>Radio Boys Leave a</u> Legacy by R.R. Ballantine.

With the turn of the 21st century, amateur TV and digital communications appeared. CARA members continue to be at the leading edge of technology, following the example set by our founders. Hams communicate across town and around the globe using various technologies such as CW, voice, video, and computers. Where there is a need for communications, CARA is ready to serve!—be it for emergencies or public events. CARA welcomes visitors into the official hobby of NASA and looks forward to a bright future.

This year, The Cambridge Amateur Radio Association, Inc. will celebrate its 100th birthday as an organization (official date is December 4, 1913). The name of the organization/club has changed several times throughout the years, but the organization existed even when they were ordered to dismantle during World War II. One of our founding members also established the first broadcast station in the area WEBE, which he moved to Zanesville as WALR, which he sold to a corporation and became WHIZ.



As part of our celebration we sold commemorative calendars and mugs. We are selling T-shirts, sweatshirts, and ball caps. We are also writing a book, which should be available some time before our birthday.



We are having 12 Special Event Stations this year--1 a month--as part of our celebration. We are also planning a reunion picnic on July 20 and an awards banquet on December 14. Our next Special Event Station on May 4 [from the parking lot of Hopalong Cassidy Museum (S. 10th St. Cambridge less than a block from Wheeling Avenue)] commemorates William Boyd aka Hopalong Cassidy, a native of Guernsey County. Chuck Keeton K80BW SK

(Editors Note: The following comes from Butch, WA8SHP.)

I doubt if there are any hams in the Alliance area who knew K8OBW, but he was an instrumental in the Canton Club (W8AL) in the late 1950's and through the early 1970's.

His name was Chuck Keeton and his wife was Edith Keeton, K8VKT. He still has a few "old timers" who are in the area and kept in touch with him via e-mail. Chuck was 87 on July 17th, 2013, which is when he joined the Silent Keys.

Chuck drove truck for Ohio Fast Freight making a daily run between Canton and Columbus for a long, long time. He had a two meter rig in the truck and was active on every repeater from Canton to Columbus for many years. He was one of the original trustees of the Canton Repeater. Chuck was instrumental in getting a lot of people into ham radio, including me.

He was the first "real live ham" that I met. His QTH at the time of his death was Chapin, South Carolina.
